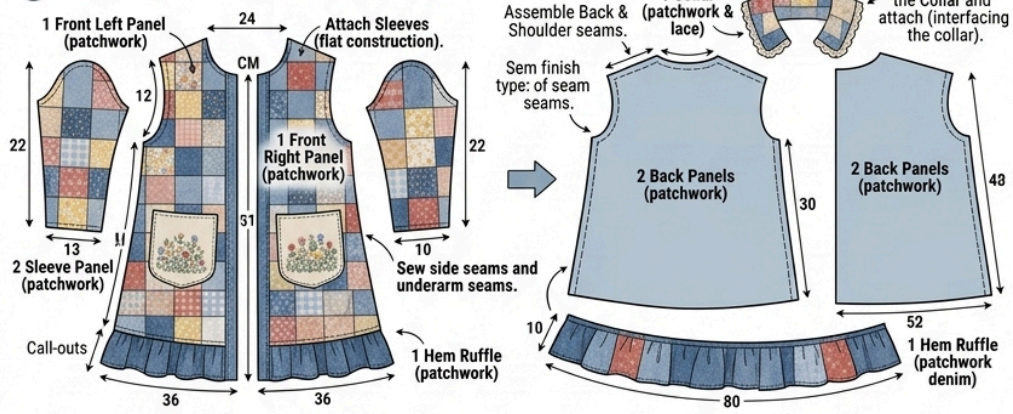

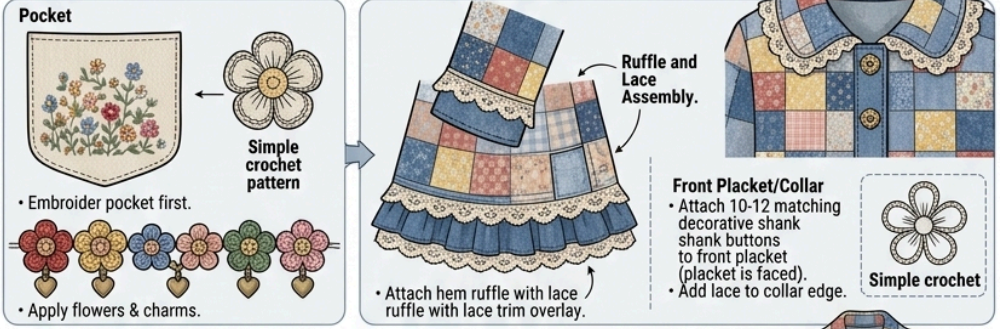

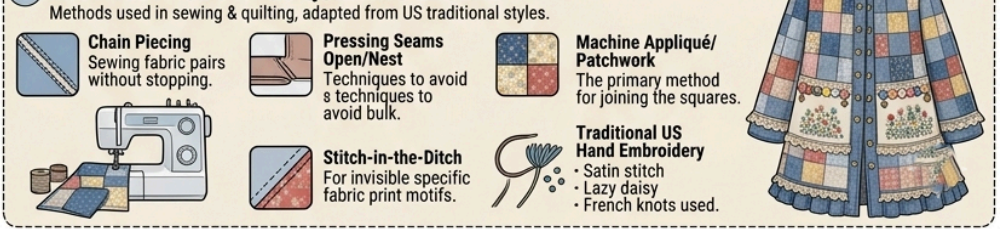

This step-by-step guide will walk you through creating a beautiful patchwork coat with embroidery, lace details, and a ruffled hem. Follow carefully, and you'll be able to complete this project from start to finish—even as a beginner with patience and basic sewing skills.

Stage 1: Planning & Materials

Before starting, gather all your tools and materials to ensure a smooth process.

Tools:

- Rotary cutter
- Cutting mat
- Quilting ruler
- Sewing machine
- Pins or clips
- Iron

Fabrics & Supplies:

- Assorted cotton and denim squares (about 300+ pieces total)
- Denim fabric (for structure and contrast)
- Cotton print trims (approx. 30 meters)
- Ecu lace trim (approx. 10 meters)
- Embroidered wool blend fabric (approx. 0.5 meters for pockets)
- Lightweight fusible interfacing (optional but recommended)
- Decorative buttons (10–12 pieces)
- Small decorative charms (optional)

 Tip: Pre-wash all fabrics to prevent shrinking later.

Stage 2: Creating the Basic Patchwork Blocks

Start by building the fabric that will form your coat.

Cutting the Squares:

- Cut fabric into **10 cm x 10 cm squares** (adjust size if needed).
- Prepare a mix of denim and cotton prints for visual variety.

Assembling the Blocks:

- Arrange squares into rows.
- A typical panel layout is about **60 cm wide by 50 cm tall**.
- Sew squares together row by row.
- Then sew rows together to form large panels.

Technique Tips:

- Use **chain piecing** to save time.
- Press seams open or to one side to reduce bulk.

Optional Step:

- Apply **lightweight fusible interfacing** to the back of panels for added structure.



Stage 3: Garment Assembly (Sewing)

Now you'll transform your patchwork panels into a wearable coat.

Front Panels

- Cut **2 front panels** (left and right), each approx:
 - Width: 36 cm
 - Length: 51 cm
- Shape the neckline and armholes as shown in the guide.

Back Panels

- Cut **2 back panels**:
 - Width: 52 cm total (combined)
 - Length: 43 cm
- Sew the two back pieces together at the center.

Sleeves

- Cut **2 sleeve panels**:
 - Length: 22 cm
- Shape the sleeve curve at the top.

Assembly Steps

1. Sew shoulder seams (front to back).
2. Attach sleeves using flat construction (before closing sides).
3. Sew side seams and underarm seams in one continuous line.

Collar

- Create a **patchwork collar (approx. 26 cm wide)**.
- Add interfacing for stability.
- Attach to neckline carefully, aligning evenly.

Hem Ruffle

- Cut a long strip (approx. 80 cm total length).
- Gather slightly to create a ruffle.
- Attach along the bottom edge of the coat.

💡 Tip: Finish seams with a serger or zigzag stitch to prevent fraying.

Stage 4: Detailed Decoration (Embroidery, Trims, Buttons)

This is where your coat becomes truly unique!

Embroidered Pockets

- Cut pocket shapes from wool blend fabric.
- Embroider floral designs before attaching.
- Sew pockets onto front panels.

Embroidery Ideas

Use simple hand embroidery stitches:

- Satin stitch
- Lazy daisy stitch
- French knots

Add small flowers and decorative charms for extra personality.

Lace & Ruffle Details

- Attach lace trim along:
 - Hem ruffle
 - Sleeve edges
 - Collar edge
- Layer lace over ruffles for a delicate finish.

Front Placket & Buttons

- Create a front placket (folded edge).
- Attach **10–12 decorative shank buttons** evenly spaced.
- Ensure alignment for proper closure.

 Tip: Reinforce button areas with interfacing to prevent tearing.

Stage 5: Finishing Techniques (Quilting Methods)

Use these professional techniques to elevate your coat:

- **Chain Piecing:** Sew multiple pieces continuously without stopping.
- **Pressing Seams Open/Nesting:** Keeps fabric flat and reduces bulk.
- **Stitch-in-the-Ditch:** Sew along seam lines for an invisible finish.
- **Machine Patchwork:** Main method for joining squares efficiently.
- **Hand Embroidery:** Adds a traditional, handmade touch.
